World AIDS Day is an annual event held on 1st December. It is an opportunity for people worldwide to unite in the fight against HIV, to show support for people living with HIV, and to commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related illness.

Equalise. End AIDS. End pandemics.

The inequalities which perpetuate the AIDS pandemic are not inevitable; we can tackle them. This World AIDS Day, 1st December, UNAIDS is urging each of us to address the inequalities that are holding back progress in ending AIDS.

The "Equalise" slogan is a call to action. It is a prompt for all of us to work for the proven practical actions needed to address inequalities and help end AIDS. These include:

- Increase availability, quality and suitability of services for HIV treatment, testing and prevention so that everyone is well-served.
- Reform laws, policies and practices to tackle the stigma and exclusion faced by people living with HIV and by key and marginalised populations so that everyone is shown respect and is welcomed.
- Ensure the sharing of technology to enable equal access to the best HIV science between communities and between the Global South and North.
- Communities will be able to make use of and adapt the "Equalise" message to highlight the particular inequalities they face and to press for the actions needed to address them.

Data from UNAIDS on the global HIV response reveals that during the last two years of COVID-19 and other global crises, progress against the HIV pandemic has faltered, resources have shrunk, and millions of lives are at risk as a result.

Four decades into the HIV response, inequalities still persist for the most basic services, like testing, treatment, and condoms, and even more so for new technologies.

Young women in Africa remain disproportionately affected by HIV, while coverage of dedicated programmes for them remains too low. In 19 high-burden countries in Africa, dedicated combination prevention programmes for adolescent girls and young women are operating in only 40% of the high HIV incidence locations.

Only a third of people in key populations — including gay men and other men who have sex with men, transgender people, people who use drugs, sex workers, and prisoners — have regular prevention access. Key populations face major legal barriers, including criminalisation, discrimination and stigma.

We only have eight years left until the 2030 goal of ending AIDS as a global health threat. Economic, social, cultural and legal inequalities must be addressed as a matter of urgency. In a pandemic, inequalities exacerbate the dangers for everyone. Indeed, the end of AIDS can only be achieved if we tackle the inequalities which drive it. World leaders need to act with bold and accountable leadership. And all of us, everywhere, must do all we can to help tackle inequalities too.

"We can end AIDS if we end the inequalities which perpetuate it. This World AIDS Day, we need everyone to get involved in sharing the message that we will all benefit when we tackle inequalities," says UNAIDS Executive Director Winnie Byanyima. "To keep everyone safe, to protect everyone's health, we need to Equalise."



Red Ribbon Campaign

Every year people wear a red ribbon to pledge their support to people living with HIV.

The red ribbon continues to be a powerful force in the efforts to increase public awareness of HIV and to reduce HIV-related stigma. It has inspired other charities to utilise the symbol, such as the pink breast cancer awareness ribbon.

Empowering students to become the generation that ends HIV stigma this World Aids Day

Chiva is a national charity (with its head office in Bristol) working directly with children, young people and young adults living with HIV and their families.

Chiva's mission is to ensure that children, young people and young adults growing up with HIV become healthier, happier and more in control of their own futures.

Opportunity for Schools

A new education toolkit, developed by the Chiva Youth Committee (children and young people living with HIV), has been launched this year at a Parliamentary event and Chiva is offering to facilitate sessions in secondary schools using the toolkit.

The toolkit is designed to educate young people in key stages 3 and 4 with the facts about HIV in an engaging way and inspire them to become the generation that ends HIV stigma.

The toolkit is used alongside a screening of Chiva's award-winning short film, *Life Growing Up*. The film provides insights into the lived experiences of young people growing up with HIV in the UK.

Sessions could be timed to coincide with World Aids Day, or could be scheduled for other times during the year, for example when schools are covering Relationships and Sex Education.


